Posterior tibial tendon dysfunction (PTTD) affects females more often than males¹ Runners with low arches are 3x more likely to have PTTD than runners with high arches²





PTTD is a degenerative and progressive condition of the posterior tibialis tendon.

Diagnosis is based on stages:
